Mr. Kelley's work fills the lacunae left by the destructive ravages of time, restoring the vibrant flesh and color to representations of ancient Greek deities. His careful studies of ancient statuary place the subjects back in their original context as living models before the working artist's eyes. Mr. Kelley earned a degree in art history from the University of Tennessee and a degree in architecture from Pratt Institute in New York. He studied painting and drawing at the Art Students League and the New York Academy in New York. During the course of his career Mr. Kelley received commissions from the Morgan Library, the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, and Yale University. Mr. Kelley has shown his work at, among others, the John Pence Gallery in San Francisco, Ca., Fischbach Gallery in New York and Pandora Old Masters in Milan, Italy. His work is represented in private collections and was published in the New York Times, the American Arts Quarterly, the Italian magazine, "Amica", and the architectural publication, "The Classicist." Mr. Kelley is a fellow of the Morgan Library, and a fellow of the Institute of Classical Architecture. He divides his time between his studios in New York City and Knoxville, Tennessee.

Hixenbaugh Ancient Art's exhibition "GREEK MYTHOLOGY NOW" opens September 15th and runs through October 8th (11am – 6pm, Tuesday – Saturday). Hixenbaugh Ancient Art will host a reception with the artist, Mr. Kelley, on September 29th from 6pm to 8pm.
